An Overview


The Local Government system has been restored in the province on 1st September 2015, after a suspension period of six (06) years. The CDGP completed its three years on 31st August 2018. Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's local government setup is relatively more enhanced than the other provinces. Public representatives have been empowered to solve their issues at a micro-level with the keen support of the honourable Muhammad Asim Khan-Nazim CDGP, and the overall functionary.

For the very first-time record funds have been provided to the district council, town councils, neighbourhoods, and village councils for the progress at a micro-level. So far, four (04) consecutive budgets have been presented by the Nazim CDGP. During the three (03) completed years, the CDGP has played a vital role in multiple Domains in the form of both ADP and Non-ADP schemes.

Infrastructural development ranges from the uplifting of transport terminals and a new food street to a mega 'Peshawar Uplift Programme'. Development of new blocks and halls in schools and colleges, provision of missing facilities in all schools, and rewarding cash prizes and laptops depict a major investment in the education. In the meantime, several recreational, youth, and sports activities have also been concluded. In the health sector solarizing the institutions, food testing labs, and preventive and rehabilitation campaigns are noteworthy initiatives. Social integration has also advanced through empowering women, special people, minorities, prisoners, and transgenders.

Budgets presented by the CDGP

Making and presenting a budget for the public is not just a matter of assigning figures to the given particulars in spreadsheet software. Far from it. It is a continuous process with many parts and many stakeholders involved. It is a recurring process of listening to the people, working with the decision-makers, convincing substance about the prioritised schemes, and bringing all the elements together in a budget presentation.

The CDGP, knowing the importance of the utility of public funds, has tapped several unconventional domains aside with the usual functional areas. A settled criterion to pass any scheme incorporate its gender responsiveness, improvement in the urban lifestyle, socioeconomic impact, environment friendliness, social integration element, and extent of making the district a better place to live.

The CDGP so far has presented four budgets between 2015 to 2019. None of them has been created in a vacuum but with the keen involvement of all the key stakeholders for prolific results. The honourable Muhammad Asim Khan - Nazim CDGP, has always stood against the inequity and favouritism in the distribution of the developmental funds among the people in a closed circle. Instead, all the budgets have been passed with an equal distribution of funds among the members of the district council to provide equal opportunities for development in their respective geographic areas.

TRUST BUILT WITH CONSISTENCY













Trust in public institutions by both international and local organisations is pivotal. The CDGP being a state institution is determined to provide a better future to the district, therefore; it collaborates with all potential stakeholders. "Trust is earned when actions meet words" (Chris Butler).

'Helping Hand', an international non-governmental organisation, has provided health related equipment to the district health department through CDGP for the Basic Health Units, the Rural Health Centres (RHCs), and Category D Hospitals. Asian Humanitarian Organisation (AHO) has also collaborated with the CDGP to fight against polio in high-risk union councils. They have also co-operated in the sanitation projects in some areas. Below are a few projects worth mentioning, initiated with the support of donor agencies.

Muhammad Asim Khan - Nazim CDGP, has signed a multilateral MoU on 28th May 2019 with Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Chamber of Commerce and Industry, UN-HABITAT, and PRIME organisation for the development of Peshawar Economic Development Unit. Nazim CDGP in a talk emphasised on nurturing the economic

activities and job creation through the new economic zones.

Another MoU has also been signed by Mian Shafiq ur Rehman - Director General CDGP, on 8th February 2019 with the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Board of Information Technology for the Peshawar Smart City Project which incorporates digitisation of all the devolved departments and also to contribute in the tech industry by developing a Digital Complex in the district.

Urumqi city of the Peoples' Republic of China and Peshawar have been declared Sister Cities. The District Nazim has mentioned that students exchange programme between Peshawar and Urumqi will start soon to introduce the culture of both countries among the students.

The better utilisation of space, the proximity of visitors, room for expansion, technological development, lowering the maintenance cost, giving a fresh start and a good makeover are the basic requirements of the modern-day working spaces to create a productive and welcoming environment for both the visitors and office holders. Although it involves a lot of planning, a temporary upheaval for Staff, and a lot of resources to give the idea a practical shape, but government institutions should go through such developmental processes in the better interest of the public.

The old building setup of CDGP was getting inadequate day by day with no room for further expansion for the modern-day needs of the officeholders, record keeping, and other

management related issues. The available amenities were not very compatible with the visitors' heavy influx, and the corresponding maintenance cost was also raising. Small parking space was yet another issue, which at times created physical barriers both inside and outside the premises.

To overcome the problems and enhance the productivity, City District Government Peshawar has recently inaugurated a new CDGP Peshawar Secretariat with an investment of Rs. 30 Million. The two core purposes of developing this secretariat were to formalise the overall setup and channelize all the activities as per the modern-day requirements and to provide one window operation to the public.








The trend of dining-out is slowly gaining ground in our


Government of Peshawar had the vision and foresight to

An amalgamation of modern food has also brought a variety in the heart of city. It is not only the food there that is important - it is the environment. The Namak Mandi Food Street maintains all of this thus giving the visitors an authentic Peshawari dining experience.


Parking facilities are very important to cities. A city must have enough parking spaces to provide its residents and their visitors a place to park their vehicles. Since cars and motorbikes are the main factors in transportation, a city must meet the needs of the drivers. If people can't find a place to park, or if they have to pay too much for parking, these people probably won't come back to the particular place to do some more shopping, dining or spending money in any other way. Also, the residents must have enough place to park their vehicle near their house and workplace.

Currently, the populace in the walled city is facing severe traffic issues due to a rapid growth in the population, the number of vehicles, and a high influx of traffic from the outskirts, especially in the Namak Mandi food street area, where people visit from farflung areas and other cities and provinces to enjoy the traditional cuisine of the city of flowers. Traffic jam due to inappropriate parking and lack of parking spaces is causing socio-economic issues in the vicinity.

To overcome this issue CDGP has initiated a mega project i.e. the first multi-storey parking plaza project of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa in the heart of the walled city - Namak Mandi, right in front of the newly developed food street, to cater the parking needs of Kohati, Namak Mandi, Bajauri Gate, and other nearby areas. After the construction of the parking plaza, there will be a ban on parking in the surrounding areas which will be helpful in traffic management. The old market on the proposed piece of land has been demolished and the construction is in process. Total investment in the project shall be around Rs. 350 Million with an estimated annual income of Rs. 120 Million. After the completion of this pilot project, parking facilities at other identified places will also be initiated.

Rehabilitation of Drug Addicts

Drug addiction is a major public health problem. Many people misunderstand how someone becomes a drug addict. It is something beyond moral principles and willpower to overcome the problems associated with drugs. This complex disease usually takes more than a strong will. Drug rehabilitation centres use both medication and psychological therapies to overcome the problem and to transform the addict into a normal person.

Following the vision of "Sehat ka Insaaf", the District Government has developed Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's first ICE Rehabilitation Centre, which has been formally inaugurated on 28th January 2019 by Mr. Mehmood Khan - Chief Minister of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, accompanied by Mr. Muhammad Asim Khan - Nazim CDGP and other dignitaries. The centre is comprised of hundred (100) beds, a separate ward for women, and food and stay facility for the patient attendants. ICE is a newly discovered drug with an extremely harmful chemical formulation. The decision has been made due to an alarming increase in the number of ICE addicts, and also to reintegrate the affected citizens (mostly students) with society.

To bring out the drug addicts from the vicious circle, CDGP has collaborated with a developmental sector organisation. With the support of district administration, a crackdown operation in the year 2016 has been done to find out the drug addicts and to admit them in the drugs rehabilitation centre of the collaborating organisation with a vision to make them a productive part of the society. Many of them are now living a healthy life with their families and also generating livelihoods. CDGP is also working in close coordination with the law enforcement agencies by facilitating them to break the network of drugs mafia.



Milk Testing Laboratories

Health is the greatest gift.



Laboratories play a pivotal role in certifying safe and healthy commodities. Nowadays in the dairy sector, from farm to end-users, it is very important to ensure that the milk production is free of microbial agents, steroids, stabilisers, harmful chemicals, antibiotic residues and other contaminants. A dedicated and wellequipped team is very important to fight the adulteration.


Milk contamination is a very major issue in the metropolises of Pakistan. Before the formation of CDGP, there was only one testing lab in Peshawar for all the food products to cater to the whole Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province. It was very difficult to get results in time due to the limited capacity of the only laboratory and sometimes the results took months. The ultimate consequence due to lack of evidence was the feeble enforcement of the law.

CDGP after its formation has formed state-ofthe-art Milk Testing Laboratories in collaboration with the provincial Livestock Department one in Badaber, another near Bacha Khan Chowk, and two other mobile labs. The milk testing labs proudly serves Peshawar's Dairy Industry by providing analytical test results for both regulatory and research purposes. The labs' scope in dairy testing is of the highest standard and by using approved and accredited methods, currently; around fourteen harmful chemicals and water content can be detected in the milk just within two minutes. With the help of the mobile facilities, authorities check the milk entering Peshawar from the surrounding areas and Punjab and destroy the contaminated produce on the spot with other necessary penalties including fines and jail. District Council - for the very first time, has prepared legislation to facilitate the whole process.

Motivation comes from within, but we can provide the fuel needed for ignition. While motivating students can be a difficult task, the rewards are more than worth it. Motivated students are more excited to learn and participate. Rewarding the distinct talent also creates a sense of cognitive competition among other fellow students to bring the best out of them.

The CDGP after its formation has allocated a significant chunk of the budget for education. Apart from the spending in the infrastructure and allied facilities, CDGP has also invested in creating a healthy competition among the students by accessing the talent and awarding the distinct position holder students in the form of cash prizes of Rs. 7 Million and laptop computers of worth Rs 10 Million in the years 2016-2017 and 2017-2018.

In 2016-2017, the top three position holder students in annual matric examination from Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education Peshawar (BISEP) have been awarded the laptops and cash prizes. For first position holder Rs. 100,000 and a laptop, for second position holder Rs. 50,000 and a laptop, and for third position holder Rs. 25,000 and a laptop have been awarded. In the same year, laptops have also been awarded to the top position holders in 200 Government High Schools. In 2017-2018, cash prizes of Rs. 35,000 per student have been awarded to the top position holders in 200 Government High Schools. Laptops have been also awarded to the top ten position holders in matric exam from BISEP in 2017-2018.







After the successful implementation of STEP Programme Season One, the CDGP extended it to the Season Two, a formal ceremony of which has been organised on 29th October 2018. The core objectives of extending the programme to the year 2018-2019 were to encourage the position holders and generally to motivate all the student.

The honourable chief guest Mehmood Khan -Chief Minster KP, accompanied by Muhammad Asim Khan - Nazim CDGP, have distributed cash prizes and laptops among the deserving students. The Chief Minister has admired the passion and conviction of the Nazim CDGP towards education by categorically mentioning the CDGP as a role model among other district governments.

Laptops have been distributed among the top 12 position holders in the Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education Peshawar, whereas 186 government school top position holder students, both boys and girls, have also been awarded the cash prizes of Rs. 6.5 Million.

Nazim CDGP - in his closing remarks, thanked the Chief Minister, Zia Ullah Bangash - Advisor to CM for Education, Kamran Bangash - Advisor to CM for Science, and other dignitaries for their keen support and presence.

"Education is the passport to the future, for tomorrow belongs to those who prepare for it today" (Malcolm X). Investing in education is actually an investment in the brighter future of the nation. Access to quality education at a basic level can make a real difference in later life. In fact, "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world" (Nelson Mandela).

The CDGP so far has the highest investment in the education sector as compared to other districts and is envisioned to empower both the education department and the students who are the leaders of the future. So far, an approximate sum of Rs. 300 Million has been utilised for the betterment of primary, secondary, and higher secondary education through numerous fruitful initiatives.

Some of the prominent interventions by the CDGP for enhancing the infrastructure in the educational sector in District Peshawar are repair and maintenance work at Municipal Inter College for Boys at Wazir Bagh with at a substantial level, construction of a whole new block at Municipal Inter College for Girls Shahi Bagh, installation of renewable solar energy setup in 300 schools, security equipment including walkthrough gate and CCTV equipment in management offices, provision of different basic facilities to 1,400 schools including electric water coolers for clean and cool drinking water; lavatories; boundary walls; computer labs; repair and maintenance work; etc













The amenities in any public transport terminal is perceived in a different manner by planners, infrastructure developers, financial experts, and other stakeholders. The passenger's perception is nevertheless decisive. The service quality is well connected with the inside design of terminals, with the facilities in terminals and with the provided service standards. In order to provide a high level of service, the activities taking place in the public transport terminal should be carefully analysed and dimensioned.

The CDGP has a deep insight into the problems faced by the populace in the public spaces, including the public terminals. The most frequent issues reported during the year 2016-2017 were the traffic jam due to multiple entry-exit points and hawkers across the boundaries of the terminals, water and sanitation issues, security threats, lack of hygienic food and

refreshments, and appalling condition of the waiting areas with no allied facilities.

To ensure the service quality in the three main public terminals of Peshawar, the government has invested a significant sum of money. Rs. 28.7 Million have been expended on General Bus Stand Haji Camp, Rs. 20.5 Million on Kohat Bus Stand, and Rs. 10 Million on Charsadda Bus Stand, for the construction of boundary walls for security purpose, mega superstore for standard quality products in Haji Camp, vehicle service decks, water filtration plants for clean drinking water, upgrading and development of waiting areas, a total of 66 public lavatories for free utility, and green belts and green areas inside the premises for the very first time in the history.

Livelihood for the Marginalised







"Earning of livelihood by following some profession is better than living on charity." ~ Umar bin al-Khattab (R.A.). CDGP believes in sustainable livelihood for poverty eradication by empowering the marginalised communities. Several projects have been initiated on a small and medium scale to uplift the unemployed and low-income group of the district.

During the tenure of the interim provincial government in 2013, around 119 shopkeepers were expelled from Khushal Bazar (formed under the Faqirabad flyover), Hashtnagri in an anti-encroachment drive. The shopkeepers were there from decades and most of them were the only breadwinners for their families. Although the action had been taken after the court orders but without measuring the consequences and developing an alternate

plan for those who became redundant. The displacement had caused unrest in the community and starvation in the households, which also led to protests, riots, and appeals to the decision makers.


CDGP - knowing the importance of the matter, has participated in detailed sessions with the affected people, and after a mutual consensus planned and developed 119 shops near Shahi Bagh for the displaced shopkeepers to prevent their families from hunger. The shops have been handed over to the victims in a formal inauguration ceremony in 2017 in the presence of Mr. Pervez Khattak - the then honourable Chief Minister of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.



It is conscious about the need for cultural and youthful activities in the District Peshawar, therefore; organises events and activities time to time as a significant contribution in the cultural preservation. Another key element is to engage the talented youth and the senior professionals of the region in the healthy, recreational, and rewarding event.

Sifwat Ghayur Memorial **Children Hospital**

"Children are not the distraction from more important work. They are the most important work" (Anonymous). Access to child healthcare facilities is still a challenge in developing countries, especially in rural areas. According to the medical reports, one child dies every minute from the prolonged immunisation diseases, diarrhoea, and acute respiratory tract infection.

Sifwat Ghayur Memorial Children Hospital is the only children hospital in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and remains open 365 days a year to provide high-quality medical facilities to the children. People also visit the children hospital from districts other than Peshawar to avail the dedicated medical facilities for children. Over a period of time, both the population and diseases have been increased due to which the workload on the only children hospital also increased.

The CDGP has taken several substantial initiatives to increase the capacity and to operate the hospital at an optimum level. Provision of general medicine, medicine for frequent diseases, preventive vaccines, TIG injections, medical equipment, instruments, adding the modern security features, construction of medical stores and miscellaneous work, sitting areas development, and disease-specific wards are some of the initiatives which have been taken over a period of 3 years. So far, an approximate sum of Rs. 25 Million has been invested in the children healthcare. Some of the required facilities i.e. darkroom for inborn diseases and babies burn centre, are in the planning phase.

VARIOUS HEALTH PROJECTS

Public health is an area of interest for the governments who care about the greater interest of their people. Public health initiatives at the district level certainly affect people every day in every union council. It addresses broad issues that can affect the health and welfare of individuals, families, and communities, both now and for generations to come. The provincial health department without the support of district government cannot achieve their goals.

City District Government Peshawar, apart from the renewable energy projects in health sector, enhancement of the only children hospital of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and facilitating the various campaigns like dengue; polio; diabetes; etc., has taken several other important initiatives that are directly associated with the public health to cater the growing healthcare

The surgical services at Naseer Ullah Khan Babar Memorial Hospital, Peshawar have been upgraded with a sum of Rs. 10 Million. Projects like repairs and maintenance work, construction of new blocks, and purchase of medical and security equipment have been carried out in Basic Health Units (BHUs) and dispensaries in various union councils, and in the hospitals in the jurisdiction of CDGP by investing a big chunk of allocated funds. A BHU at Bazidkhel, destroyed in a terrorist attack, has also been reconstructed with an approximate investment of Rs. 9.1 Million. The total budget so far utilised in the health projects is significantly higher than in other districts.

Prevention is better than cure.







Disease prevention campaigns at grassroots are very essential components of global efforts to control major public health threats such as polio, dengue fever, smallpox, diabetes, and others. "Good health and good sense are two of life's greatest blessings" (Publilius Syrus).

CDGP since its formation is actively participating in disease prevention campaigns including dengue fever, polio, diabetes, etc. by facilitating other stakeholders including the District Administration, departments of Provincial Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, donor agencies, and the local communities. Sensitising the communities about the health-related issues and involving them in the campaigns is a tested way of doing things for a greater impact, that is why CDGP has a prime focus on making the campaigns inclusive and interactive.

During the formation of District Government, the reported dengue fever cases in Peshawar and adjoining areas were rapidly increasing. CDGP, since the day first, has been running an antidengue campaign, encompassing fog spray, larvicide spray, and general awareness. During an outbreak in Tehkal in mid-2017, the campaign had been enhanced with more energy and resources after which very few cases have been reported in the year 2018. CDGP has also contributed to the eradication of polio by facilitating the District Administration Peshawar and the Health Department of Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa at every level. Diabetes is a growing disease associated with the lifestyle, therefore: an awareness seminar has been facilitated by the City District Government.



CAPACITY BUILDING OF DIRECTORATE OF FISHERIES

CDGP - knowing the importance of biodiversity, has concluded an efficacious capacity building project in November 2017 to uplift the Directorate of Fisheries, Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa for the prolific enforcement of Fisheries Ordinance 1961 & Fisheries Rule 1976 & amendment therein, especially in the district Peshawar.

Illegal fishing practices due to either scarcity of awareness or weak law enforcement, and lack of replenishment of hatcheries and natural reservoirs through fish seed stocking are the most crucial challenges identified by the district government. These significant issues got extended to districts neighbouring the Kabul river over the past two decades due to the absence of appropriate training, lack of equipment, and lack of fish seeds to raise their population in the river.

To make sure the protection of fish and the biodiversity; CDGP has developed and

implemented a comprehensive capacity building project encompassing three essential areas. Staff training is the primary element for disseminating awareness and law enforcement which has now done. Secondly; the department has also been equipped with mobile motorbikes for an enforcement drive and prompt reporting. Last but not least, around seventy-five thousand (75,000) fish seeds have been also released in the Kabul river and a fund of Rs. 2 Million has been provided to procure another 1 Million fish.



THE REVIVAL OF INDIGENOUS CULTURAL HERITAGE




Protection of heritage sites is the mandate of government as per the Antiquities Act and also it is a part of the United Nations' charter for tangible cultural heritage. Peshawar claims to be the oldest living city in the region and one of the oldest cities in the world. Its recorded history is more than 2500 years. During the past decades, the heritage sites became damaged due to ageing, lack of maintenance, and especially due to encroachments. The whole thing has affected the historic value of the city.

District Government – since the beginning, is aware of the importance of the heritage sites, therefore; ensuring their protection from infringements and other possible damages. Several initiatives have been taken in the form of preservation of City Wall and Gates, renovation of the Cunningham Clock Tower, and others.

In ancient times, city walls were used to enclose and protect a city, town or other settlements from potential invaders and also to mark the territorial boundaries. Peshawar is among the cities of Pakistan which were protected with the surrounding walls by the then rulers. The wall – with various entry and exit gates was initially developed by the Italian Governor General Avitabile, then a mud structure by a Sikh Governor and a solid wall was developed in the British Raj.

A restoration drive was initiated to repair the damaged parts of the city wall and gates. A sum of more than Rs. 14.6 Million have been expended so far on the patchwork and other potential uplift areas. Another significant initiative is the renovation of the Clock Tower in Ghanta Ghar which is a yet another historic landmark of the city.







The cottage industry around the globe is a source of sustainable livelihood for many women-led households. This industry is growing in developing countries. The genuine indigenous handicrafts have remarkably high value for money if channelized properly.

Women-led households with no livelihood opportunities are one of the most deprived segments of the society due to lack of planning and social integration practices in the past. To overcome the problems CDGP has initiated a dedicated 'Women Welfare Programme' which is offering diploma courses for women and different training workshops also have been organised to enable them for earning bread and butter.

A significant amount has been invested in craft-making centres and provision of equipment for the women-based cottage industry in the adjoining areas of the district. Five (05) existing handicraft centres have also been enhanced with the basic facilities. In the years 2016-2017 and 2017-2018, the CDGP has provided sewing machines, pico machines, overlock machines, mosaic machine, eyelet (kaaj) machine, to the deserving women and the relevant institutions for the betterment of the underutilised residents of the district.



Pakistan has a religious Constitution which gives the minorities equal rights. The CDGP believes in the social integration and coexistence with basic rights and facilities for all and recognises its responsibility to cater the special needs of different religious minorities in the district which cannot be covered in the schemes benefitting the public at large.

The CDGP is against the manipulation of the religious minorities for socio-political benefits and believes that the right path to success and

the ultimate solution is to reintegrate them in the mainstream through dedicated efforts and schemes. CDGP has taken numerous initiatives have been taken for the minorities in the past three years. There are five (05) elected minorities representatives in the District Government setup.

Every year Christmas celebrations are funded by the CDGP in the district. Numerous sports activities have been organised for minorities in the meanwhile. CDGP also funds the minorities institutions through the elected minorities representatives. Recently a solar-powered tube well has been installed by the CDGP for the continuous supply of clean drinking water to the residents of the Christian Colony. Minorities have an added benefit of a flexible utilisation of funds as compared to the majority.









Social exclusion is the process of systematically blocking some people from various rights, opportunities, and resources that are usually available to others. The outcome of social exclusion is that the affected people cannot fully participate in the economic, social, and political life of the society in which they live. 

therefore; the CDGP has planned to initiate some projects for them.

In the years 2016-2017 and 2017-2018, the CDGP has provided wheelchairs, and tricycles to the deserving individuals and the relevant institutions for the betterment of the underutilised residents through ten different schemes. A three days sports gala in December 2018 and 'Inmate Sports Festival' in 2019 have en organised in the Central Jail Peshawar to ovide a healthy recreational activity to the risoners. Various sports competitions have een conducted in the event including tug of ar, volleyball, table tennis, badminton, baddi, karate, and bait-bazi. Sports competitions have been organised in the same month in the Malik Tehmas Stadium for trangenders to explore their untapped h and separately for the handicapped midgets, to portray the image of comprehensive society.



UP LIFT PESHAWAR



Muhammad Asim Khan - Nazim CDGP, after been appointed as the focal person for Peshawar Uplift Programme by the Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, has a prime focus of developmental schemes in the district. A sum of Rs. 678 Million have been utilised in the fruitful development of seven (07) important roads in District Peshawar by KP Government with the keen facilitation of CDGP. The roads are also serving as the alternate routes during the construction of Bus Rapid Transit (BRT).

After the formation of the CDGP, the disconnect between the urban settlements and surrounding areas now has been eliminated. District Government has taken several encouraging initiatives to uplift the Peshawar's surrounding areas. Construction of Kohat Road, City Circular Road, and Bara Road are the major project of Peshawar uplift programme whereas there is a list of other projects of public interest including sanitation and drainage project with

an additional Rs. 50 Million, link roads, and other missing facilities. Micro-level projects are other than the aforementioned ones.

CDGP has also supported the Water and Sanitation Services of Peshawar (WSSP) to bring the city at par with the standards by providing uninterrupted clean drinking water and overcoming other water and sanitation issues. A grant of Rs. 30 Million has been transferred to WSSP for cleaning of canals and drainage system, waste management and acquisition of waste management vehicles. The progress of WSSP has been marked better after the capacity building initiative.
